

## **Community Connections**

#### Warming Centers in Polk County

From Denvy and Gail Saxowsky: Brent Demoes of Polk County and Commissioner Jennifer Wheeler were present during a discussion of what is needed for homeless people in Polk County. It's hard to briefly summarize a one-hour meeting with Brent in an email but here goes.

...Brent set the stage for the meeting. I briefed them on our discussion in the Happiness class we held recently. We shared ideas, dreams, limitations, ongoing projects and possible thoughts on housing homeless persons in Polk County.

If one were to establish housing for homeless in Polk County there's a good chance that the word would get out and others would move to Polk County just for the homeless shelter. A screening process might need to be considered if the goal is to help the locals.

Apparently Dallas UMC is considering some additional facilities at their church to house vets: addition to church with toilets and showers, allowing campers on property, purchasing another reloadable to house persons. This will probably be focused on male vets.

Brent receives calls during the cold winter nights for housing and as a church we have the minimum resources with we could find people to be in the building during sleeping hours.

City of Dallas can allow about 4 mini-houses on a single lot, but the houses must be onsite and not moved in.

Monmouth Library reported that homeless hang out in the library during the day for electricity and Wi-Fi and after hours hang around outside for Wi-Fi and electricity but the city has decided to turn off the outside electricity and Wi-Fi.

Northwest Housing is thinking about buying and then moving in some 30's buildings (\$1 purchase, \$8K to move) on a lot near the river near the Independence dog park.

Commissioner Wheeler will talk to Independence. She has and will be attending meetings in the state regarding housing homeless persons.

Brent will be meeting with the Dean of the College of Education at WOU about the use of some of its buildings.

I know I've missed a lot of what was discussed but this gives you an idea that much is in process. The services provided during Community Connect in January will be focused on homeless persons. It is expected that the head count of homeless may be more accurate this year.

City and state land use codes are limiting as far as where to locate facilities for homeless and how existing facilities may be used.

Thanks for all you encouragement and move[ment] forward with a great need in our community.



Linda Scheirman comments: "Not sure near the dog park is a good place as a homeless hang out. The downtown, more public area seems a more healthy location [and safer an more accessible for a warming station].

Tuesday evenings

will find up to about a dozen WOU students around a table in the back corner of the Sing Fay restaurant. They wander in pairs and singles, some before 5:00 and some after. Many are familiar faces, some are new. The new ones write their email addresses by their names on the sign-in sheet, regular just write their names. The settings include chopsticks, forks, ice water, and plates for Americans, warm water bowls for Chinese. After a few minutes a bowl of rice and a variety of dishes are passed around the table.

Either before the food or during the food each person at the table shares their POWs, WOWs, and HOWs. POW is something bad that happened during the past week; WOW is something good and HOW is "How is your spirit, your soul doing this week?"

Nick, the Western Compass program director, opens discussion on a topic of relevance based on national, local or campus news. Sometimes it's a spiritual development activity like a finger labyrinth, sometimes a chapter from a book like "What is the Bible?" Almost always there's an opportunity for safe open conversation.

Meanwhile during the week, Nick spends time of campus with students and developing programs for the entire campus. Back home, incidentally, Nick and his wife are adjusting to twin boys born mid-November and preparing for a Christmas of smiles and giggling.

#### **Current Tax Bills Cannot Be Biblically Defended**


WASHINGTON — Monday the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA (NCC) issued the following statement condemning the tax cut proposals currently under consideration in the U.S. Congress:

The tax bills currently before the U.S. Congress are designed to make the rich richer and the poor poorer. Additionally, they add \$1.5 trillion to the national debt. These tax plans cannot be biblically defended.

"The rich rules over the poor, and the borrower is the slave of the lender. Whoever sows injustice will reap calamity, and the rod of anger will fail (Proverbs 22:7-8, NRSV)." These words of warning from Holy Scripture serve to remind us that over time, those in power who steal from the poor will weaken the body politic and invite chaos. "Oppressing the poor in order to enrich oneself, and giving it to the rich, will lead only to loss (Proverbs 22:16, NRSV)."

The *National Council of Churches* prays our elected leaders heed these ancient words of wisdom which bear witness even today. Our lawmakers have a responsibility to care for the entire citizenry, not just those with the means to influence tax policy.

# Kentucky public school allowing evangelicals to constantly harass non-Christian kids: mom:

A Stanton, KY mom named Heather Estes says her children are being bullied at school because they are not evangelical Christians like their classmates — and that adult school employees have joined in on the attacks.

On Tuesday, Estes shared her story with a private Facebook group for atheists. In it, she explained that the vast majority of children at Stanton Elementary attended a daily Christian service before school called The Upper Room. Her children are perceived by their classmates as outsiders as a result and other kids have slammed tables into them and harassed them.

Estes said that when her son spoke to a teacher about the issue, the teacher said that he had to stand in front of the classroom and explain his beliefs. "You're going to have to stand up for yourself if you insist on being different," said the teacher. "Historians agree that the Bible is the most historically accurate book of all time."
