Christians Can Stop Trump's Wall by Jim Wallis

Donald Trump's wall is obviously a terrible idea: It's both impractical and ineffective — and more importantly, it's immoral. Building Trump's wall would be building a 2,200-milelong monument to racism.

Trump's wall has nothing to do with fixing a broken immigration system. It will waste money and result in cuts to more effective and important programs. It's not about strengthening national security; it's about fueling national paranoia. And Christians must ensure that it doesn't move forward

There are several indications that the wall won't do what Trump promises or accomplish its stated goals.

A 2015 government study indicated that the bulk of illegal drugs that enter the U.S. come hidden in trucks through established border checkpoints, so a wall wouldn't keep drugs out of the country as Trump claims. As for undocumented immigrants, the Pew Research Center tells us that not only has immigration from Mexico been falling for years, long before Donald Trump took office, but at this point more Mexican immigrants are leaving the United States than are coming in each year.

Methodist Conference Dilemma

The United Methodist Church will be in the news this week, as the (ecclesial) legality of Bishop Karen Oliveto's election, consecration, and appointment will be decided by the UMC's Judicial Council. Bishop Oliveto is the first married lesbian pastor to be elected by a judicial conference as a Bishop. A letter from our Bishop was distributed on Sunday, May 30.. You can read it here:

Statement by Rev. Mary K. (Sellon) Huycle (PNW Conference voting member of the Western Jurisdiction which elected Bishop Oliveto)

...in our era, Methodists have wrestled as new understandings emerged in the dominant culture about slavery, segregation, and woman. The first woman was ordained in 1866, but it wasn't until 1956 that women received full clergy rights. Methodists splintered over slavery and while they reunited in 1939, segregation was part of our formal polity until 1958. These "issues" couldn't have been imagined by those first followers. Fortunately, they left us a pattern of discernment and adaptation.

The judicial Council decision is not a statement about the worth of LGBTQI persons. It is not a statement about whether or not they should have full rights in The United Methodist Church. It was The Book of Discipline, our church law, that was on trial here. Does it allow for the contextual adaptations needed during a time of transition?

The answer we learned with the Judicial Council decision, is "no." There is now even greater urgency for the denomination to engage with the process that the Bishops' Way Forward Committee will be bringing us. In the meantime, however, we must prioritize caring for persons made even more vulnerable by this decision.



Denomination News

- Christ's Church has been a safe place to explore our faith and to be iconoclasts, a safe place to ask questions and to wonder why.
 There has been a sense of freedom, "I don't want to be told what to think or do, but be given opportunities to listen to alternatives and make up my own mind."
- We have come to rely upon, admire, and be inspired by our companions here, even those with whom we wrestle.
- We have found opportunities to grow in our faith and in our service.
 There are many good experiences of service and opportunities for helping and leading - there is support and strong leadership to help others become leaders; "living out the Bible."

Community Connections

Rapid Response Training for people wishing to serve as Legal Observes and otherwise to respond to ICE Raids will be offered on May 6, 2pm, at the Dallas UMC, 565 SE LaCreole Drive, Dallas, Oregon. The training will last 3-4 hours. English speakers are welcome. This event will be a combined event between Polk County Hudddle and Polk Community for Human Equality (PCHE).

There is a BIG need for rapid responders in Polk County. Substance Abuse Awareness Training

Half the money from the Peacemaking Special offering, taken annually at Christ's Church, will support an informational meeting and training on the use of drugs and alcohol by youth.

Polk County Family Community Outreach will present a Substance Abuse Awareness Training on Tuesday, May 9, 7:00PM at the Henry Hill School in Independence. The training is a joint effort of Polk County, the Central School District and Christ's Church.

The training will last about one hour and is designed for teachers and parents to help them be awareness of youth abuse drugs and alcohol, what are the emerging trends and what they may do to curtail this problem. This training is not for minors. If this training is not relevant to your life, perhaps you know someone who might benefit from the training; encourage them to attend.

Free Clinics

Medical: Clinic days continue to be held on the first and fourth Saturdays of each month but we're having trouble meeting the increased demand. It is now important for people to call in and make an appointment before the clinic day, because there are more walk-in patients coming than we can accommodate in recent weeks.
