#### Welcome to All

We welcome ALL to Christ's Church. Knowing that God has created and love all people, delighting in the gifts and diversity of us all ... We invite all persons, regardless of age, disability, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, or gender to participate fully in the life of this Body of Believers—as we experience the Love of God together

#### **DISCIPLINE:** It's not a four-letter word!

As far back as childhood I can recall adults complaining that the young people just "have no discipline" or that they should be "taught some discipline". It seemed to me that what most of them really meant was in reference to "a good paddlin" or a "swift spankin" or, in my step-father's case, "a good whuppin" that was typically administered with a hedge limb you had to cut and bring to him! Ah, the good ole' days! Such discipline was designed to elicit compliant, more appropriate behavior.

Once I got a little older the term "discipline" took on a somewhat more humane meaning, i.e. it referred more to a sense of training – either the mind or the body – for the purpose of regimenting oneself academically, intellectually, or physically. The amazing Olympic athletes seen on our televisions these days are the product of intense discipline designed to deliver peak performance in their respective event. Like many today, I had to exercise self-discipline in working my way through rigorous academic training in preparation for my chosen field of ministry.

Still later I learned that the denomination in which I am ordained has an entire *Book of Discipline* (BOD). This document is updated after every quadrennial General Conference of the world-wide church to include any changes that are made to it. The BOD contains the history, theological understandings, organizational structure, policies, practices, "laws" used in the governance of the Church. The BOD is followed to greater or lesser degrees by all United Methodist churches and clergy as a tool that unites us into a common body for the sake of fulfilling the mission of the church.

So it's clear that "discipline" is not a four-letter word! It is also clear that the term takes on different meanings in different contexts: behavior modification (even if sometimes crudely applied!), performance enhancement, and mission fulfillment. However, there is yet another facet of this word

that is crucial to both individual spiritual growth and to the life of the church as a community of faith.

I am referring to spiritual disciplines and discipleship. Again, please remember that this is not a four-letter word!

Spiritual disciplines are those faith practices that help modify our behavior, increase our knowledge, and focus our mission and that also make us more human! They include the various "means of grace" such as the sacraments, prayer, worship, fasting, serving, scriptural study, etc. Regular participation in such practices is essential for our spiritual growth. For that reason every church will benefit from developing and regularly promoting their unique discipleship process that is available for every person the church encounters inside or outside of the church. How would describe to a newcomer the way in which Christ's Church MPU can help them grow spiritually as a disciple of Jesus? What, if any, is the process?

Such a process need not be a rigid "cookie-cutter" requirement but a grace-filled, never-ending, multi-path invitation to everyone to come as they are and to proceed as they are led to do so. It is vital, however, that people are made aware that a lighted pathway



<u>is</u> available to them should they choose to walk it on their unique journey. Spiritual growth as disciples – followers of Jesus' Way – doesn't happen in solitude but always in concert within a community of faith where discipleship is valued and practiced but never forced. Only through the practice of spiritual disciplines does one's deep soul formation of compassion, mercy, agape love, tolerance, sense of justice, kindness and humility take root and blossom.

Your church should afford everyone the opportunity to learn selflessness, cooperation, respect for differences, social awareness, sensitivity to and respect for the value and dignity of all persons, environmental and resource stewardship, the importance of community and so very much more. Your church must teach, model, and then send you out to practice your faith. It should also provide an arena in which reflection with others is encouraged and nurture is given. *This*, then, is the discipline of the spirit that is not so much taught as it is *communicated and lived*. Such discipline is not a four-letter word but is, instead, an invitation to life in the Realm of God. Thanks for being a part of it as we continue the journey of faith together!

# **Living Homeless**

It's been almost a year since the PJM (Peace, Justice and Mission) committee asked the question about what is the homeless situation in our communities. Now Christ's Church with numerous other churches, agencies and individuals is working with the Salem Interfaith Hospitality Network to conduct a pilot project to determine if a similar network in Polk County is feasible.

The date of this pilot project is March 16 – 23, Sunday to Sunday. During that time up to four homeless families with school age children will be sleeping and having meals at Christ's Church. Classrooms will become bedrooms, the basement will become a living/dining room and volunteers will become hosts and cooks.

The pilot is an extension of the Salem IHN with the possibility of creating a similar network of churches to house and feed families on a rotating basis. IHN caseworkers screen the families based on need, school children, and whether they are free from drugs and alcohol. Each day the families



arrive at the church at 5:00 PM where they are greeted by volunteer hosts for the evening. A bit later another set of volunteers bring the evening meal. Still later in the evening there's a change of guard when the overnight hosts come in.

In the morning volunteers bring in breakfast and set out food to make box lunches. By seven o'clock the families head out to the IHN center where they shower and prepare for the day which consists of attending school, going to work or looking for employment and housing. That afternoon they all return to the center and back to the church at 5:00PM where the cycle starts all over again.

The IHN program is not designed for all homeless; it focuses on families with school children who need a little help to get them back on their feet. The average time that a family spends in the program is about four weeks and the success rate, meaning that the family has a suitable income and housing, is 91%.


The need to support these families is emphasized by the fact that the caseworkers at the center turn away as many as ten families in a week. The estimate of the number of homeless persons in the Polk communities is around 300, many of them children who couch surf or live with relatives, sometimes in garages.

The program will not only benefit families who are down on their luck, but will also develop relationships among the churches in Monmouth, Independence and Dallas. Volunteers from several churches and communities agencies as well as students from the university will serve as hosts, cooks and coordinators. Recruitment for volunteers will continue. # **Finding Our Next Pastor**

Actually the title should be more like listening to hear whom God is sending as our next spiritual leader.

So here's what's happening. The committee, the DPNC, short for Designated Pastor Nominating Committee, finished their work defining who we as a church are in early December. Later in December they received more than a dozen PIFs, that's short for Personal Information Form, which is similar to a dossier or resumé.



After praying and pouring over the PIFs for several weeks, the DPNC created a short list, and agreed to challenge each other to think, pray and review that list more carefully again. After all, a short list is only one step on a path to eliminating everyone but one. Review each PIF through the lens of what the perspective candidate will or could do for our churches, was our challenge, and how each one might affect our favorite programs. The DPNC is also reviewing sermons and moved to the next stage at the meeting on February 3.

The DPNC has shortened the short list, and is moving into the interview process for those candidates and ultimately recommend a candidate to the board and congregation. When? This is a good time to pray.

A STORY FROM STEPHEN MINISTRY "I'd been struggling with some spiritual wounds that were pretty intense and needed healing- things I didn't want to share with family and friends. But on that visit as my Stephen Minister walked next to me, I felt safe and comfortable. So I shared my deepest hurts with her- some really painful things that I feared she might judge me for and that made me wonder if God could possibly love me.

After I told her these things, I was really nervous and dreading her response. I was worried that she would think I was an awful person. But instead she put her arm around me and said, "I'm sorry you had to go through that". And that was a turning point for me. To go from fear of judgment to a positive affirmation of care, empathy, and even sorrow for what I'd been through- it was so meaningful. That's when I began to feel God's love again."

# **Polk Community Free Clinic News**

The Polk Community Free Clinic remains active and open, helping those individuals without access to health care. We have seen many of our patients change from our system to have coverage and now have become part of a regular primary care provider clinic. This gives them access to health care like most of us have enjoyed, the ability to make an appointment when we need it and not have to wait 2-3 weeks. We also understand that less than half of the uninsured

people have made this leap to have health care coverage so now we need to reach those people who still need our services.

This past year the Polk Community Free Clinic has served 424 persons with 454 appointment times with a provider. This has included medical care, mental health care, patient education and prayer. The prayer team also gave out 75 prayer shawls. Appreciation goes out to everyone who has helped keep this ministry going. The recipients cuddle those shawls and feel your warmth and prayers.

## **Special Guest Musician Spotlight**

Kuan Jiang started guitar playing at age 17. He played rock and pop songs with friends who were in a same band, and played gigs in and outside school. He was also a science major in high school back in his hometown of Nan Ning, China. In 2006, He came to United States for a bachelor degree in accounting originally, but only few weeks after Kuan arrived at school, he consulted professors in the music department and changed his major to music. Since then, Kuan has been very into studying music. He has been studying a variety of guitar playing styles such as jazz, latin, and rock with guitarists Christopher Woitach and John Stowell. Later on, Kuan broadened his interests to the composition/arranging area, as well as jazz piano. He studied composition techniques with Dr. Kevin M. Walczyk, Dr. Keller Coker, jazz pianist

Gordon Lee and Percussionist/Composer Adam Bates for years, after that he taught himself mostly to strengthen his piano techniques. Right after graduation, Kuan produced his first album with his musician friends' help; most of the pieces were written originally for music scholars as the materials for a graduate program.

In the years when Kuan resided and schooled in Oregon, he performed with many great local players like Tom Bergeron, Keller Coker, Louis Pain, and Mel Brown. In 2011, Kuan went home to China. Having been

soaking in music for some time, he decided to find a job and restart his new life with small and practical things. By teaching himself and

consulting his friend who is a art-designer, he learned to use software to design advertisements and soon became an ad designer in a firm. As a musician, he occasionally worked as a part-time pianist in cafés, as well as a free-lancing guitarist/keyboardist/composer/arranger and has been active in Nan Ning City in China. The most important teaching experience to him is being a full/part-time music teacher for two and a half years in China. In 2013, Kuan came to United States for his master degree in music.
