Christ's Church Prayer Team. One of the ongoing ministries of Christ's Church is the Prayer Team (formerly called the Prayer Chain.) These are people who have volunteered to pray for concerns submitted to them by church members and friends. It currently has 19 members plus Pastor Becky. Concerns are added to the list in two ways: calls or e-mails to the coordinator or Pastor Becky, or requests for prayer on Sundays during the Prayers of the People. When these concerns are received, the coordinator sends out an e-mail to all of the team members giving information about the specific concerns for prayer. The coordinator also tries to send updates as further information is received.

Historically we were called a prayer chain, and prayer requests were passed on by telephone. However, this method became cumbersome due to the need to make multiple calls or to leave long messages, which we were not sure were received by the team. Since all team members presently have access to e-mail, email has proved to be a much more efficient method of communication. Also the team members do not have to make notes or remember the details. (Have you ever played the game Gossip? You would be surprised how some of the messages changed in the chain process.)

Requests for prayer should be cleared with those to be prayed for whenever possible. All information should be kept confidential.



Oregon/Idaho Holy Land Task Force



The United Methodist Oregon/Idaho Annual Conference strongly encourages all churches and/or districts to have a study based on the "Kairos Response" document, an advocacy group that is promoting the adoption of a proposed resolution, "Aligning United Methodist Investments with Resolutions on Israel/Palestine," in preparation for further action at the 2015 Annual

Conference session. The legislation calls for all boards and agencies "to divest promptly" from three companies whose products are used in the occupation - Caterpillar, Motorola Solutions and Hewlett Packard.

In addition, the resource guide, "Working for a Just and Lasting Peace In Israel and Palestine" is being distributed to our churches. This makes two documents that will be ready to use! Christ's Church had a United Methodist Women's study on this topic several years ago and several books are available for additional reading.

Praying for Others

– Linda Grund-Clampit

The form of prayer with which we are most familiar is praying for others. It is often called intercessory prayer. But despite our familiarity, many of us have a vague discomfort with it. We have two basic questions: does it work? and how are we to do it?

Our trust in intercessory prayer is grounded in our trust in God. Some of us may feel at ease in the presence of God and feel a deep trust. It is easy for us to bring those we love and for whom we have concerns into God's presence and to trust God's loving activity in their lives. Some of us cannot claim that experience, but we do claim the promises of Scripture and our tradition that God desires wholeness, health and peace for every person – and that Christ's offering of himself for each one is ongoing. The concern that we raise in prayer is already contained in Christ's own prayers. Your faith that this is so may be small, but your love and longing for the other person may be large enough that you will step out on that bit of faith and find that it grows. And if we find that we can't take that step ourselves, we may put our trust in the faith of others. When we ask in worship for prayers for our friends and loved ones and for our concerns about the world, we are asking this. It is a precious part of our communion in the Body of Christ – that we can ask this of others, and that we can hold this trust for others.



Does it work? Sometimes we can answer joyfully and affirmatively, "YES!" But what about when we can't answer that way? There are so many understandings offered for this. One is that prayer changes the pray-er, opens us up to new insights, creates a willingness in us to do for the other. This is true. Another is that even though physical healing may not come, spiritual healing may and this is more important. This is true also. Yet another is that we do not know the grander plan of healing and redemption that God is working on, and so we have to be prepared for an "answer" to our prayer that isn't what we hoped for. True, yet again. But none of these true answers may suffice until we experience them ourselves. And, in my experience, the only way to enter these answers "from the inside" is to keep praying. Prayer is an activity which grows out of our relationship with God and nurtures our relationship with God. The only way to find out if it "works" is to keep praying.

Here is A Practical Exercise in How to Pray For Others from 50 Ways to Prayer: Practices from Many Traditions and Times by Teresa A. Blythe. This book is in the Prayer Studio at church for your use. In it, you are sure to find a way that "fits" you, or will re-invigorate your prayer practice – there are many and varied ways to open ourselves to God's care and guidance.

- Begin seated comfortably in a chair. Take at least five deep, slow breaths. Say to yourself, "Here I am in the presence of God's everlasting care and love."
- Using words, spoken or unspoken, state who and what you are praying for. Let your prayer be uncensored. Just lay your heart's desire out before God.
- Then become silent. Allow a visual image of God surrounding the person to emerge in your imagination. It could be a bright light, or Jesus holding the person in his arms, or any image that presents itself to you. In your mind's eye, see the person becoming whole and reconciled in the situation. Feel the grace of God transforming the person or situation.
- Using words, spoken or silent, ask that God's desire and purpose be fulfilled. Release the person or situation into the fullness of God's care. Leave the outcome in God's hands.
- Raise your arms in a body prayer, offering all that you are and all that you prayed to God.

The topic of intercessory prayer is immense, as are the myriad ways to pray, and these articles only offer the briefest exploration. Two other resources in the Prayer Studio that can deepen your exploration are Soul Feast by Marjorie Thompson and the "Pray for One Another" issue of the journal Weavings.



We held a successful Pancake feed to raise money (\$525) for the Imagine No Malaria Campaign Tuesday evening, Sept. 30. A compelling video was shown by Jo Ann King demonstrating the need and the work to eradicate malaria. This campaign started in 2008 when the Methodist General Conference adopted Global Health as one of four areas of focus. While previous work has made significant strides in Africa, Malaria continues to remain the key reason for hospitalization and one of the top killers of children under the age of 5 years and pregnant women.

Imagine No Malaria is a ministry aimed at raising \$75 million toward the elimination of malaria deaths in Africa by 2015 – and eliminating Malaria as a scourge is actually doable! A comprehensive system of education, communication, and treatment, has been developed in partnership with the African Conferences to establish a multilevel means of targeting the disease. - See more at: <http://www.umcmission.org/Give-to-Mission/Search-for-Projects/Projects/3021190#sthash.rWIXf4tb.dpuf>

Did you know we have a movie producer in our congregation? We do. Have you ever wondered about that little blue house at 150 S Knox on Monmouth's City Park block? Well, that houses WIMPEG, an intergovernmental agency owned by Western Oregon University, and the cities of Independence and Monmouth. WIMPEG stands for Western Oregon University-Independence-Monmouth-Public-Education-Government (WIMPEG) public access TV. Its mission is to broadcast local culture, history, performances, and information pertinent to our local community. It broadcasts on the MINET cable TV system, with past shows available via YouTube, as follows:



- Channel 17, dedicated to Western Oregon University programming,
- Channel 18 focuses on Monmouth community programming
- Channel 99 focuses on Independence community programming
- YouTube at youtube.com/wimpegTV.

Video contributions by community volunteers are aired as well as scheduled government events such as City Council Meetings. Currently WIMPEG recruiting efforts are underway to train volunteers to record cultural, historical, and artistic performances for the community.

Communities are learning they have important needs that aren't being addressed elsewhere. For example, needs for educating people on health issues such as diabetes, or how to prepare for catastrophic events. Over the years WIMPEG's role as information provider is growing. The WIMPEG website states: "Our role is growing and our need for volunteers has increased with it. Contact us to find out how to get training and contribute to the community." They also state:

"Did you know we currently have three WIMPEG producers with their own shows?"

Sherry Pittam has been producing for WIMPEG for a few years now. She covers the Christ Church of Monmouth's services. We have schedule space for another church to be on air but it's not possible without the dedication and training like Sherry puts into it."

- an official messenger bringing news; the first sign or indicator. A proclamation, signal, or foretelling...

messenger l' mesənjər l

- carrying or bearing a message

signal l' signəl l

- a gesture, action, or sound used to convey information or instructions, typically by prearrangement between the parties concerned
- indicate the existence or occurrence of (something)

Follow up on Ebola

Yet another set of ominous projections about the Ebola epidemic in West Africa was released that gave worst- and best-case estimates for Liberia and Sierra Leone based on computer modeling.

In the worst-case scenario, the two countries could have 1.4 million cases by Jan. 20 (if the disease keeps spreading without effective methods to contain it). ... In the best-case model, the epidemic in both countries would be "almost ended" by Jan. 20, the report said.

Without effective intervention in Africa, Ebola will spread throughout the world. In fact, one case has already been diagnosed in this country. Projections are based on data from August, but Dr. Thomas R. Frieden, the C.D.C. director, said the situation appeared to have improved since then because more aid had begun to reach the region. Churches are an important factor in providing effective intervention.

"My gut feeling is, the actions we're taking now are going to make that worst-case scenario not come to pass," Dr. Frieden said in a telephone interview. "But it's important to understand that it could happen."

Even a single slice of pizza involves a global distribution network, industrial agriculture, fossil fuels – and a lot of water. That's the food, water, and


energy nexus in a slice.
